John Moser was regarded as one of the most learned jurists in Germany. In his youth, however, he was greatly influenced by Voltaire, the Frenchman who is considered one of the greatest adversaries of Christianity. Moser read what Voltaire had written and took Voltaire's ideas to heart.

Moser experienced a spiritual transformation. Soon he set aside the teachings of Voltaire and became a devout Christian. Moser determined that real wisdom found its source in God's Word.
