Anyone who has welcomed a new child into their lives knows the joy of that arrival and the immense work it takes to care for that precious, helpless human. Congratulations on the newborn! Now you get to be sleep deprived for three months... or more!

What happens when you are accepted to the prestigious college for that advanced degree? Yippee! Now it's time to work harder than ever to learn even more things!

From the very beginning, God created us to work: *The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it.* Genesis 2:15

Solomon, seeking the true purpose of every moment in life came to this conclusion along the way: So I saw that there is nothing better than that a man should rejoice in his work, for that is his lot. Ecclesiastes 3:22
